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## 1.1 INTRODUCTION

St. Joseph's College of Education was named after St. Joseph, its Patron Saint. The College was founded in 1971, by the late Bishop of Mysore; the Most Rev. Dr. Mathias Fernandes. Coupled with the visionary zeal and the dynamism of the Secretary, Rev Fr. Dennis Noronha, the college was established on the firm foundation of the motto of ' Love, Loyalty and Service'. It is situated on the Mysore- Madikeri State high way in Mysore City. This seat of learning overlooks the picturesque Chamundi hills and is adjacent to the Manasagangothri, Karnataka State Open University campus.

St. Joseph's College of Education is one of the 153 educational institutions governed by Mysore Diocesan Educational Society (M.D.E.S) and has a rich experience of more than sixty years in the field of managing colleges and schools in the southern districts of Karnataka. At present, the college is efficiently managed under the patronage of His Excellency Rt. Rev. Dr. K.A William, Bishop of Mysore and the dynamic leadership of the Secretary and the Correspondent, Rev. Fr. Vijay Kumar. The college is affiliated to the University of Mysore and enjoys the status of a religious minority. ## **1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY**

### **Curricular Aspects**

As the college is affiliated to University of Mysore, the institution follows the curriculum and academic calendar stipulated by the University. The curriculum is structured in a democratic way by the university. The members of different Boards of Studies act as mouth pieces of suggestions and demands. Our College follows

the admission procedure prescribed by the Government of Karnataka and University of Mysore. Institution has made commendable progress in imparting quality education by Integrating I C T enabled teaching –learning, pedagogical analysis, concept mapping, communication skills, cultural activities, life skills, value based education and holistic development of personality, which is reflected in our vision, mission and institutional plan of our college. Good feedback mechanism adopted by our college helps to reflect and strive hard for the pursuit of excellence. This has helped in modifying, redressing the grievances effectively and updating our institutional programme.

Flexibility in curriculum planning and transaction at the college level is ensured by taking feedbacks from students and faculty members and incorporating that in the curriculum prescribed and is in tune with the needs of the day. The needs of diverse students like slow learners and advanced learners are catered to. Through a well organized mentoring system and peer tutoring, the students are well monitored and tutored. At present the college offers 8 Pedagogy courses, 3 elective courses and 3 value added courses started as a post accreditation initiative. Sufficient flexibility is also offered within the courses by offering different mode of transaction.

### **Teaching-learning and Evaluation**

Teaching, learning and evaluation are the three aspects that add to the quality of education and distinction of institution. The college possesses a bunch of teachers who are real mentors and are qualified with required skill and competence to cater to the needs of student in different pedagogies. 50% student enrolment is done through Common Admission Cell administered by the Government of Karnataka, strictly adhering to the rules and regulations of University and NCTE norms. Since the college is under minority status 50% of students are enrolled under management quota based on merit.

The teaching- learning and evaluation procedure of the institution adheres to the academic calendar prepared in accordance with the University Academic Calendar. An orientation programme is conducted prior to the commencement of every semester, where the students are detailed about all activities of the college. The learning levels assessment of first year students are based on content proficiency test and Teaching Aptitude test. After that, Content Enrichment is provided. Mechanism to honour student`s diversity is in place in the college and are provided special training sessions like remedial coaching, tutorial sessions, peer teaching, workshops, seminars etc. ICT enabled teaching learning techniques are used in classrooms. Students are made aware of evaluation process during orientation programme. The institution provides a student handbook with detailed information. The evaluation report will be given to the parents at PTA meetings. Grievances regarding internal assessment are taken care by grievance cell, where the class teachers along with coordinator address the grievances. Students are trained in teaching skills through micro teaching and simulation workshops at the college and through internship and immersion programme in reputed schools.

### **Infrastructure and Learning Resources**

St. Joseph's College of Education has got excellent infrastructure facilities in a vast area of 07 acres. The college building is designed with good ventilation and lighting facilities. The college is located by the side of state High way Mysore- Madikeri overlooking the Chamundi hills. The college has a beautiful garden and

landscaped with lawn on both sides.

College building has eight classrooms with LCD projectors, multipurpose hall, conference hall, and seminar hall, computer laboratory with internet facility, psychology laboratory, art and drama room, Physics laboratory, Chemistry laboratory and Biology laboratory. We have a well-furnished partially automated library with 16,716 books, 9 journals, 27 magazines, 6000 e-journals, 3135000 e-books with separate reading facility for faculty and students. To maintain the health and hygiene of the students, rest room and toilet facilities for women and men are located in 2 different floors. Common room for Ladies and Common room for Gents give scope for students to relax during free periods. The college has a big play area of 2 acres is shared with the sister institution. The college has a neat and clean canteen facility for day scholars, safe drinking water facility on each floor and a prayer hall. For sports, indoors and out door facilities are provided. Staff and students have separate parking facility.

### **Student Support and Progression**

As a part of student support programme, the college has developed a prospectus along with the regulations of the programme, the syllabus, calendar of activities with name of the events and dates fixed in the institution plan for conducting curricular, co-curricular activities, community service programmes, community living camps etc..Small Group activities including co-curricular activities, communication skill workshop, micro-teaching, simulation and practice teaching helps in giving individual attention to students and building team spirit and cooperation among students. Each student is guided individually in small group activities by providing feedback. All these activities, in turn help the trainees to acquire teaching skills. Our motto is to develop total personality of students. Students play an active role in the academic and co-scholastic activities of the institution. Their representation is ensured through student council and various committees for various purposes. Alumni of the institution play a pivotal role in the welfare of the institution.

Some of our students get scholarship from the Government as they belong to SC, ST and Other Backward Classes. Economically weaker students of the Christian minority students get concession and scholarship from the management. The students are provided with information about various competitive examinations and PG-CETs for which they are eligible. The institution is in contact with other Career and Counseling Cells, where awareness and coaching classes will be conducted for those who appear for these examinations. Our faculty also engages the classes in this cell. Grievance Redressal Cell provides ample opportunities for students to submit their grievances to the Principal directly and resolve the same within a stipulated time. An anti-ragging committee is also constituted in the college as per the guidelines of UGC to prevent ragging. A counselor visits college twice in a week and counseling is provided to the needy.

The college is affiliated to the University of Mysore. At present, St. Joseph's Institutions are making great progress under the patronage of His Excellency Most Rev. Dr. K.A William, the Bishop of Mysore and the dynamic leadership of the Secretary and Correspondent, Rev. Fr. Vijay Kumar. The institution follows decentralised and participative mode of decision making, where the effectual implementation of the teaching-learning and the student support programmes are carried out under the strong support and guidance of college management. The principal of our college is the

executive head of the institution. The teachers also have to represent either as convenors or as members in various academic and non-academic committees and clubs of the college. Staff meetings conducted regularly at the college level ensures transparency in day to day affairs. The college also includes the organizational arrangements such as staff council, IQAC, Admission Committee, and Advisory Committee for Library, Committee for Academic Calendar, Redressal Cell, Women's Grievance, Counselling Centre, Alumni Association Committee, Placement Cell, Student Council, Cultural Committee, Magazine Committee etc. The IQAC prepares an action plan and conducts internal audit for review of the progress of the teaching learning process. Student representatives are also part of various clubs and committees.

### **Institutional Values and Best Practices**

The Best practices of our college are value-added courses like Value at School, Communication Skill and Theatre and Art. We encourage Peer tutoring and Reading week- Spark 2020 to promote Language Skills. Our College values diversity. Our institution has students coming from South Indian States, Uttar Pradesh, West Bengal, Bihar, Jharkhand, North Eastern States and Tibet. Our College emphasizes a diverse class because different perspectives allow students to learn from one another and grow in their thoughts. The interaction between students with different worldviews can help change minds or shape ideas. Our institution has most of the regional students struggling to communicate in English. So we give instructions in both English and Kannada languages.

Innovative teaching approaches are used for teaching like Concept attainment model, Peer tutoring, ICT enabled learning, Co-operative Learning, Collaborative learning, Group Investigation, Demonstration, Dramatization, Debate, Storytelling and teaching by singing in Kannada language teaching.

The needs of the specially abled students are catered by the institution by providing ramp, elevator, rest rooms and scribes to help in examinations. Infrastructure developments strictly adhere to environmental compliances. The college also initiates programmes to instill in students national consciousness, and to promote universal values of truth, righteousness and communal harmony. The institution takes care in enhancing the physical fitness of the students by providing daily sports training to students. Through agreements and MOUs, the college provide adequate and advanced training facilities to equip students with required ICT skill. The college plans and undertakes all its activity, curricular and co curricular, with the vision to carve out the best in the student's mind, body and spirit.

In our campus, throughout the year we promote the value of reducing power consumption. Our college campus is located in a prime position in the city. Each classroom is ventilated with proper light and we are not using the air conditioner. And students are instructed and motivated to switch lights and fans off when they leave the classrooms. Effective waste management is practiced.

An initiative was taken by the Eco Club members to recycle the used pens.

### **Research and Outreach Activities**

Our institution promotes research and extension activities along with teaching learning process. The college organised one Regional level seminar in the last year. Four faculty members are PhD holders. Two are pursuing

research. Faculty members have applied for two research projects during last five years. The teachers publish original research articles in International/National/Peer reviewed journals and present papers in Seminars/Conferences. Subscription to a view and access to INFLIBNET introduce new trends in higher education and research to the teachers and students.

The social responsibility of the college is fulfilled through many academic extension and community extension activities through various clubs, and Cells. They do many programmes which include Blood donation camps, Medical camp, Awareness programmes on various issues like Aids awareness, Organic farming, Gender sensitization Programmes, International girl child day, Community Development programmes, Women Empowerment Programmes, Swachh Bharat Abhiyan, Flood relief and supply of food items during Covid-19 Pandemic. To create awareness about Covid -19 online CAP series were organized. To undertake programmes to the benefit of students and society, the college has a number of fully functional MoUs with different organizations that promote faculty, student and resource exchange, training, student interaction, placement, project, internship and field trip.

Students were given opportunities to publish articles under the guidance of teachers. Six articles were published. Students and teachers prepared e-content for the teaching-learning purposes.

### **Institutional preparedness for NEP**

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:	Institution envisages to start Integrated B.Ed Programme like BA.Ed and BSc.Ed where multi disciplinary and interdisciplinary subjects would be taught. Institution is in the process of promoting course in Drama, Music, Sports, Craft and Human rights Education.
2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	Academic flexibility will be ensured by allowing students to attend one course from other institution of similar repute. Credit transfer will be ensured. Planning a MoU with other institutions for sharing of credit. Planning to create ABC depository for credit redemption and certificate issuance. Planning to register to ABC through NAD portal.

3. Skill development:	Teachers require lot of skills which are developed through various activities organized by the Institution. Hard core teaching skills are developed through micro teaching workshop, simulation workshop and internship programs. Soft skills required for teachers like creative skills, communicative skill, adaptability, problem solving, leadership skills are developed through various co-curricular activities organised by student council and during workshops.
4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):	Knowledge about Indian values and Indian system of education is developed through the course, Philosophical and Sociological bases of Education where the Vedic system of education and Buddhist system of education and other schemes that were followed in the traditional Indian classrooms were taught to students. In order to develop the awareness about the culture and traditions of our country, various co curricular activities are organised. Students are exposed to different festivals which are of national, state level and regional level importance. Students were given platform where they share about their beliefs, tradition, language and culture during Matrubhasha Diwas. Teaching in Vernacular is encouraged. Medium of instruction is both English as well as Kannada for students coming from Kannada medium and rural background.
5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):	B.Ed program focuses on developing Programme Learning Outcomes and Curriculum Learning Outcomes. When the student completes two years of B.Ed programme they are expected to develop a lot of behavioral modification in the form of outcomes pertaining to each perspective paper, pedagogical paper and enhancing professional competency paper. B.Ed program encourages outcome based education through all the activities and programs. The focus is on the holistic development of the student. Outcomes are encouraged in knowledge, attitude, skill and competencies level.
6. Distance education/online education:	The teachers and the students are well equipped with necessary skills required to conduct online classes using G Suite and other similar platforms. Besides regular classes, a number of webinars, workshops and special events were conducted through the use of G-suite products such as Google meet, Google classroom as well as Zoom. Effectiveness of such

classes was enhanced by the use of chat box and interactive whiteboards. To tackle the issue of digital fatigue, sufficient time was given at regular intervals to the students and teachers. The internet connectivity in the college was enhanced to meet the growing requirements of the faculty. Special sessions were conducted to make the students proficient in making and editing short videos, organizing online quiz competitions and digital poster designing. The college administration has addressed the issue of digital divide and has supplied gadgets to students who are in need of them. Teachers and students were encouraged to do online courses through SWAYAM portal.

#### 1.1 Curriculum Planning

**1.1.1 Institution has a regular in house practice of planning and/or reviewing, revising curriculum and adapting it to local context /situation.**

**Response:**

Curriculum is the “floor plan” or blueprint of what is going to be taught/learnt/experienced in the college over a period of time. The curriculum as well as academic calendar followed by the college is strictly in accordance with the one prescribed by the affiliating University.

Yet at the college level, academic planning, reviewing and revising of curriculum is done every year.

**Academic Planning:** Every year before the commencement of the academic year institution organizes a planning meeting with various stakeholders to chalk out Year Plan for curricular activities meticulously. The stakeholders like management, alumni, educational experts, student representatives and faculty along with the head of the institution discuss about the academic activities based on the learners' need for various curricular activities for the entire year.

**Reviewing of Curriculum:** Every 6 months, a review meeting is conducted and feedback will be collected. Review of the implementation of curricular activities which were formulated is done regularly to make necessary amendments and select the best plan for action. Review meeting is conducted with the Principal, staff, educational experts and student representatives.

**Revising of Curricular Transactions:** Based on the need and to cater to the learning needs of students' revised plan for action will be formulated. When the pandemic due to Covid-19 forced lockdown and students were forced to remain indoors in their houses, the teaching-learning process was conducted via online. Based on the directions by UGC and MHRD and following the guidelines given by University of Mysore, consent of management and other stakeholders was taken and curricular transaction was switched to online mode. Online tests, quizzes were conducted. ICT syllabus has been revised based on the present pandemic background.

Regarding the internal examination, a collective decision was taken with the IQAC and passed in the staff meeting to switch on to an online mode of tests and classes.

Flexibility in the curriculum transaction is based on the need and pressing demand of the new normal. In the previous years, seminars and tutorial classes were conducted full day, considering the readiness and receptive power of students, it was split to half day i.e half day seminar and afternoon lecture hours. Duration was increased to facilitate students.

### 1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

### **1.3.1 Curriculum of the Institutions provides opportunities for the students to acquire and demonstrate knowledge, skills, values and attitudes related to various learning areas**

#### **Response:**

#### **A fundamental and coherent understanding of the field of teacher education**

The curriculum of teacher education, particularly represented by the institutions provide experiences to prepare individuals for the classroom and is designed to meet the requirement of the pre-service teacher trainees

Teacher education is a continuous process and since teaching is considered as an art and a science, the teacher has to acquire not only knowledge , but also skills and competence to meet the challenges of 21st century classrooms.

The curriculum of B.Ed. is well planned and enriched which provides more scope for implementation.

The curriculum has theory papers such as:

- Philosophical and sociological basis of education - to give insights about theoretical knowledge.
- Psychology theories are explained in the course Childhood and Adolescence and Learning, Teaching and Assessment to equip them with the know-how about how to teach and when to teach.
- Theory of microteaching during the orientation of micro teaching workshops to enhance their skills of teaching.
- Educational Administration and Management - to familiarise with managing skills.
- Guidance and counseling - to understand nature and cater to the individual needs of students.
- Techniques, methods and approaches in Pedagogy - to equip them with varied methods and modern approaches of teaching.
- Contemporary Education in India helps in learning different educational systems.
- Educational Evaluation - to familiarise with various methods and techniques of evaluation.
- Value Education - to imbibe values.

The theory papers enrich the students, train them with the content, equip them with the knowledge necessary for their future as teachers .

#### **Procedural knowledge that creates teachers for different levels of school education, skills that are specific to one's chosen specialization**

Though the affiliating University does not provide more scope for total flexibility, choice for subjects of teaching methodology and study of elective papers provide scope for flexibility in the operational curriculum of B.Ed. course.

The theories studied are understood by practical activities. Psychology practicals based on intelligence, creativity, attitude, aptitude provide scope for implementation in real life situations.

Micro Teaching skills practiced here at college help the students to perform and implement in their lessons delivery such as skill of introduction, skill of explaining, skill of questioning, skill of stimulus variation and other skills.

As per the methodology, various teaching methods, techniques and approaches are learnt and practiced by student teachers.

Feedback after the lessons by the supervising teacher and peer group help in incorporating and correcting in their regular classes.

Values learnt in various value oriented classes help students to imbibe these values in their real life situation / classroom situation

Skills of classroom management, programme organization, maintaining discipline help them to make connections among disciplines of study.

### **Capability to extrapolate from what one has learnt and apply acquired competencies**

The learning outcomes -based curriculum framework is based on the promise that every student and graduate is unique. Each student has his/her own characteristics in terms of previous learning levels and experiences, life experiences

Our student teachers practice communication skills, micro-teaching skills, and integrated lessons in small peer groups which help them to master their skills and perform well in their regular classes. Reflections of the lessons taken and reflective diary make them improve in their further lessons.

Video lessons and video recording of their lessons would help student teachers to reflect on their performance

Observations of demo lessons and classroom lessons given by lectures and the experienced teachers in the schools during internship and during school visits help students to acquire skills and put them into practice.

Orientation on preparation of teaching aids, writing of lesson plans help students for internship and to make use of them in their future teaching careers.

### **Skill / Competencies such as : Emotional Intelligence, Critical Thinking , Negotiation & Communication skill collaborations with others Etc.**

Life skills are abilities for adaptive and positive behavior that enables individuals to deal effectively with the demands and challenges of everyday life. Teacher education does look into skill development of trainees. Life skills are discussed as a theory and their importance are viewed and there in tried to be inculcated in our students.

Teacher is a social engineer who does the role of “Man making “and “Nation building”. Students learn the theory of emotional intelligence and attend a practical in Psychology in emotional intelligence. Apart from this, special motivational talks organized by the college make them aware of its importance.

Opportunities are provided for students to assume responsibilities in various activities of the college, celebration of religious festivals, national festivals, special assemblies and other days of importance.

Various committees, clubs are initiated and club activities are conducted in Eco club , Maths ?-rates club, electoral literary club, Abhivyakti Kannada Sangha, language club and social science club which enhance their organizational and participatory skills and team work .

Weekly co-curricular activities provide ample opportunities for trainees to manifest their talents. Literary activities such as quiz, debate, essay writing, paper-presentation, composition of poems etc., help to develop literary and communicative skills

Field trips are organised to milk dairy, natural history museum, DFRL, AIISH open day, Gandhi bhavana, Home for the aged, special schools, residential school etc., to gain hands-on experience.

Community living camps are organised for each batch of students with the objective of developing wholesome personality development. Values such as sharing, adjusting, leadership, participating, equality, simple living are imbibed through these camp activities.

All activities are focused on gearing our student teachers towards a healthy and effective future career.

### **1.3.2 Institution familiarizes students with the diversities in school system in India as well as in an international and comparative perspective.**

#### **Response:**

Diverse in language, culture, colour, race, religion, caste and so also in the school system. Diversity is the keyword of the India and Indian Education System.

The evolutions of school system in India, such as Vedic system of Education, Muslim Education system, Buddhist Education System, various schools of Education, Women Education system, Inclusive Education are familiarised through various courses,like:

- Contemporary Education in India.
- Educational Administration and Management.

- Inclusive Education
- Teacher Placement

which are studied by students as theory papers.

Various systems of schools like Morarji residential school, Kasturaba Gandhi Balika Vidyalaya, Kendriya Vidyalaya, special schools are made known through the syllabus designed.

During the second semester, students are made to visit Government schools, aided schools, residential schools, special schools as part of their field visit. During the visits, experienced teachers /Heads from the schools are requested to take a class, give a brief description about the pattern, syllabus, mode of instructions, facilities provided by the government and other organisations.

Students observe, note down, interact, and receive clarifications by understanding the work pattern, type of students, role of parents, and differentiate among the various forms of school systems.

Another opportunity the staff and students gained about different types of education system was through the twinning programme organized with the Government Teachers College, Thiruvananthapuram, Kerala.

Technology plays an integral part in making the students familiarise about the norms, standards assessment systems across the states through videos. Teacher trainees are made aware of the education system at the international level through video and comparative studies through discussions. They try to analyse the difference between Indian and foreign education systems.

An International and Comparative perspective is familiarised through discussions, video presentation, paper presentation, lectures and while teaching certain perspective papers.

Students understand the fact that:

- Indian education focuses more on theory rather than practical. The Indian education system doesn't allow creativity, whereas in foreign countries, they focus more on practical based learning and they allow creativity in Education.
- In India, education is a formality, part of routine, every Indian must get a degree of Engineering or Medical stream, whether you learn something or not. In foreign countries, education is taken as a learning process
- Foreign Education curriculum contains everything ranging from arts to sports along with studies such as music and theatre, sculptor in syllabus. Australia focuses more on sports, they have cricket, hockey and boxing in their college curriculum, whereas the Indian Education system only emphasizes on theoretical studies. There is not much room for extracurricular activities in our education system.

- In India, students are required to memorize facts and figures. Thousands of equations of mathematics, birth dates and death dates of freedom fighters, chemical reactions and hundreds of other things. We emphasize theory and in foreign countries they impart knowledge to students through practical implementation.

During the orientation programme, alumni working in different schools come and share their experience about the college and how the system of transaction which they experienced here is helping them in their career as teachers in their respective schools.

### 1.3.3 Students derive professionally relevant understandings and consolidate these into professional acumen from the wide range of curricular experiences provided during Teacher Education Programme

#### Response:

The whole curriculum is formed to enable the trainees to gain knowledge, understand them and put the acquired knowledge into practice and apply them efficiently in their teaching career. Theoretical inputs on teaching methods, skills, communication and evaluation ensure that the student trainees are well equipped for their career.

- Communication skill workshops are organised to initiate them into coming forward and speaking out. They are evaluated based on their way of communication, language ability in episode writing and presenting them effectively in front of their peers and teacher educators/supervisors.
- They gain confidence, drive away stage fear and learn to communicate well.
- Followed by micro teaching sessions in their respective methodology subjects, they are given training in writing episodes for micro teaching, selection of topics, presentation of episodes, feedback by peers and supervisors. Reteach if need be.
- Likewise simulation lessons, ICT based lessons make them more confident and to master their skills and put them to practice in their teaching career.
- Lesson plans for macro teaching in real and natural setup, writing of feedback, criticism for peer teaching.
- Students are given the opportunity to observe demo lessons by experienced faculty, alumni and also video lessons.
- In their respective practice teaching schools, they take part in the curricular and co-curricular activities.

- They conduct unit tests, action research, supervise class tests given by the faculty.
- They conduct co-curricular activities and act as judges for certain activities.
- They take remedial classes for weak students, give them re-test and build confidence in their students.
- While students are in intensive teaching practice, the teacher educators regularly visit the practice school, observe the classes, motivate them, fill them with confidence, give valuable feedback and suggestions, hence making teaching practice reflective.

By the time the trainees finish their internship they are confident to take any tasks assigned for them at the schools, hence ready for the actual school situation which they will go after their professional training. Some students take up various tests and examinations conducted by the government for which training is given in our institution, which enable them to be fully equipped and professionally qualified for the teaching profession.

## 2.2 Honoring Student Diversity

**2.2.1 Assessment process is in place at entry level to identify different learning needs of students and their level of readiness to undergo professional education programme and also the academic support provided to students..**

**Response:**

The learning levels of the students are assessed by two ways at the beginning of the programme. Based on the marks secured for qualifying exam(UG or PG)and content proficiency test, Aptitude test and language proficiency test. Entry level assessment helps to analyze the readiness of all new students which ensures they have the best possible chance of success in attaining their academic goals. Assessment results are used in the allotment of students in respective methodologies and advising processes to ensure students are enrolled in the course that is appropriate to their skill level. As students matriculate through the academic programs, their progress is tracked and the information gained is used to evaluate and strengthen programs and services.

The specific objectives for entry-level assessment are:

- a. To identify learning needs of the students.
- b. To ensure that the students have basic skills adequate to the teaching profession.
- c. To improve retention rates of students as they enroll through the system.
- d. To provide the students with experiences that will help them clarify their educational and personal goals.

e. To assess the level of readiness to undergo professional education.

Method of Entry Level Assessment followed in our College:

**Professional Competency:** At the onset of every academic year, each student has to undertake tests such as, Teacher Aptitude Test and Teacher Attitude Test that consists of a set of statements in the form of rating scale in order to know their inclination and aptitude towards the profession of teaching.

**Language Competency:**“Language across Curriculum (LAC)” activities that include communication and presentation skills that are evaluated and suggestions are given for future improvements.

**Content Competency:** Subject Competency Test will be conducted for students of different methodologies (English, Kannada, Physics, Mathematics, Chemistry, History, Commerce and Biology) by the concerned subject teacher based on the school content of VIII-X standard. After the analysis of the test; the students are provided with content enrichment program. Students who do not meet the appropriate score are referred for secondary testing.

**Technology Competency:** Use of checklist to know about the use of the knowledge and awareness regarding the use of ICT and based on which the students will be divided into groups to give training as per the need.

Activities undertaken for slow learners:

- Extra coaching and individual guidance from the subject teacher
- Solving question papers of previous University Examination by the students.
- Peer tutoring is carried out by the high achievers for the improvement of slow learners.

Activities undertaken for High Achievers:

## 2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

**2.3.1 Multiple mode approach to teaching-learning is adopted by teachers which includes experiential learning, participative learning, problem solving methodologies, brain storming, focused group discussion, online mode, etc. for enhancing student learning**

### Response:

In our institution the main focus and practice is on student- centred learning. Apart from the 'Lecture Delivery' method, teachers focus more on the 'conceptual clarity' of their subject. Teachers demonstrate to elaborate the difficult concepts in their local context and ICT tools are used to help students visualize what they are studying. IQAC encourages teachers to organize and attend the FDPs so that they will enhance these skills related to innovative teaching methodologies.

To promote student- centered learning which is the pivotal point of the teaching learning activities of the institution, various multiple mode approaches have been adopted by the teachers.

To ensure participatory activities like brainstorming, problem solving method, experiential learning strategies, co-operative and collaborative learning strategies, discussion, flipped learning and blended learning and also online mode of learning were adopted in the teaching learning process.

### Multiple mode approaches that are followed in our institution are as follows:

**Lecture Method:** Almost all teachers of the institution use this conventional, yet economical method of teaching-learning which is apt for all students. Lecture is provided in both English and Kannada medium to cater to the needs of students of rural areas.

**Co-operative and Collaborative learning:** To thrive in peer learning, students are made to work in groups to complete a task within a fixed time frame. This not only encourages group learning and time management but also helps in knowledge building of students.

**Vestibule Learning:** Vestibule learning is a benchmark of experiential learning. The institute practices this experiential method by organizing school visits (regular, residential, special,) to students. These visits expose the students to experiential learning through the interaction with different people working in those schools.

**Experiential Learning:** It is mandatory that every student has to undergo an internship to acquire experiential learning. The institute provides 50 days of internship where students undergo on the job learning under mentor. The student comes back to the institute and prepares research projects / action

research under the guidance of an academic mentor. Field visits to special schools and different types are an integral part of teaching.

**Participative and reflective learning:** Each student is assigned a topic and informed to present the topic under the guidance of the faculty. By giving presentations the students gain experiential learning and can also reflect upon the same. They write reflections about the activity.

**Focused Group Discussion:** It enables the students to gain confidence and improves the language and also encourages in developing questioning techniques. This method is carried out in the presence of a moderator.

**Blended Learning:** Teacher educators have been combining in-person teaching or face- face teaching with technology-enabled learning for a long time, by using the ICT resources in the classroom to bring about new, high-quality educational opportunities for the students.

**Online mode:** Students are given instructions in both, synchronous (with PPT) and asynchronous (email communication) mode of learning. The students submit their assignments through Google classroom and similar collaborative tools. This will help students to be competent in using ICT.

**Response:**

Continuous and effective mentoring can have a powerful impact on students during their complete academic year. Mentoring provides an influential opportunity not only to improve students' learning outcomes but also to help in improving teachers' professional attributes through learning with and from each other, making skills and experiences intergenerational.

Across all the different perspectives and based on the upcoming challenges a number of common elements are figured out by the mentors / teachers that help the students in enhancing their professional attributes.

- **Working in teams:** Mentors work in teams along with the students to develop organizational skills at the commencement of the new academic year. All the students are divided into five houses (Rabindranath Tagore, Zakir Hussain, Mahatma Gandhi, Radhakrishnan and Swami Vivekananda) by the CCA committee wherein most of the co-curricular activities are conducted in groups so as to develop the team spirit among the students. In addition to this the other activities such as peer discussions, project work, and pedagogy drama. Provide ample opportunity to build team spirit, along with this, a daily assembly programme is presented according to method wise for a week where they cooperate and collaborate. During community living camps they work in different committees and teams which help them in developing team spirit.
- **Dealing with student diversity:** Teacher educators are accessible to the students, they make time to spend with them on the campus, being responsive to their professional and academic needs. The teacher is supportive, understanding and patient while dealing with student issues during their mentoring sessions and motivates the students to be confident, self-dependent and emotionally strong. Mentors dedicate more hours to help students who are emotionally weak and intellectually slow. Some of the activities are use of IEP (one –minute paper and one sentence summary, Group discussions/ learning, group by learning style and not by ability).
- **Conduct of self with colleagues and authorities:** Every year the institution conducts various sessions / talks in order to groom the students on the professional ethics that enable them to demeanor themselves in a well dignified way not only with the peers but also with their colleagues and authorities.
- **Balancing home and work stress:** In the present scenario, it's very important for a person to know the strategies of balancing home and work stress. In our institution the students are taught the following things that helps them to do the same during their internship and thereafter.
  - Time management
  - Set goals
  - Be organized
  - Embrace change
  - Keep learning
- **Keeping oneself abreast with recent developments in education and life:**

Every day in assembly the students make an attempt to present current affairs on different areas such as economy, politics, technology and the latest developments in education such as the NEP, Govt. schemes related to education etc.

As teachers, they not only play a vital role in delivering the content knowledge but also in molding the future of the students. Hence, they have to possess the attributes of an effective mentor in terms of motivation, skill and experiences and realize the ambitions in making a difference in the lives of their students.

**Response:**

Teaching learning process always follows an approach of holistic development in students and hence, all the academic and non- academic skills are included in the teaching learning process in our college. The activities included in the curriculum of the students nurtures creativity and innovativeness among students. Activities to develop thinking skills, empathy and life skills are also included in the B.Ed programme.

The stages in which these activities are carried out are:

- Plan different strategies /approaches and to know which is the best approach to use
- Monitoring their work and being flexible
- Critically evaluating the work

- Make sure to, look at things in different perspectives

Two cases adopted in our college are:

### **CASE 1: Drama and Art in Education**

Dramatic Arts education is an important means of stimulating creativity. It can challenge students' perceptions about their world and about themselves. Dramatic exploration can provide students with an outlet for emotions, thoughts and dreams that might not otherwise have means to express. A student can, if only for a few moments become another and explore a new role, try out and experiment with various personal choices and solutions to very real problems, problems from their own life, or problems faced by other people. Hence, Dramatics play an important role in imbuing creativity, innovativeness etc among the students.

### **Objectives of Drama in Education**

- To integrate drama and art in the school curriculum
- Enabling learners to develop their aesthetic sensibilities and using drama and art in creative expression
- Enabling learners to perceive life skills such as the social and environmental issues through drama and art.
- To motivate learners to become critical thinkers.
- To accelerate communication skills.
- To engage creative collaboration and teamwork.
- To bring about creative expression through reconstructing and restructuring the given concept.
- To develop innovative ideas using waste products.
- To analyze festival performances of India.

*To attain the above objectives several activities are organized and conducted in the college.*

- Warm up Exercises: So that they will be flexible in order to adapt the theatrical movements, gestures and postures.
- Vocal Exercises were conducted for delivery of dialogue and for preparation for theatre music
- Enacting a phrase
- Performing street plays/ awareness skits: Workshop on street play wherein student teachers learn, prepare script and perform street plays on various educational, social and environmental concern like Pollution, Girl child abortion, Swachh Bharat Abhiyan, Election awareness etc.
- Developing a song, play and drama on curriculum.
- Demonstrations on the various forms of drama and art.
- Workshop on developing masks and puppets to teach the school subjects.

Thus, the dramatic skills, techniques are adopted while teaching Social Science issues related to environment, language teaching to make it more effective and creative.

### **CASE 2: Teaching Learning Materials / Web Resources**

In the field of education, "teaching/learning materials" broadly, refers to a spectrum of educational materials that teachers use in the classroom to support specific learning objectives, as set out in lesson plans. In our institution, the development of teaching-learning materials is regarded as one of the major aspects that would promote student learning and help in the achievement of academic goals and objectives. TLMs also render a significant contribution in bringing novelty and freshness within the classroom environment. These can be games, videos, flashcards, project supplies, and more.

### Objectives:

- To facilitate a holistic environment.
- To make learning joyful and meaningful.
- To prepare low cost TLM using locally available materials.
- To involve students in designing and development of TLM.
- To explore the web for finding teaching learning materials
- To illustrate the teaching points clearly by play way method.

Keeping the above said objectives, meticulous planning is systematically done to provide a better learning experience to students by enabling them to create TLM's and web resources. Students of each methodology prepare teaching learning materials for VIII to X standard classes like models, drama, storyboards, language games, puzzles, projects, videos; very creatively . They also collect resources like clippings, short videos from the internet and use it along with power point during their presentation and practice teaching.

Students are divided into groups, they put together their ideas and innovatively construct working models to teach subjects like Physical science, Life Science and Mathematics. Working in groups helps them to cooperate, coordinate, collaborate & empathize with the slow learners and complement them in constructing teaching learning material. Students prepared resource units as web resources in different school subjects using applications such as Padlet which helps in drawing mathematical diagrams, draw pictures in biology, physics etc.

##### **Response:**

Internship in teaching is an opportunity where the student teacher identifies him/ herself with the school to which he/ she is assigned. During this period the interns participate in all the school activities and also develop right attitudes, interests and abilities needed to become as a teacher of tomorrow.

##### **Orientation to school principal/ teacher:**

Every year our college invites principals/ in charge principals from the respective schools before the internship programme commences and a brief orientation is given to them based on the following:

1. To create a climate where even the slow, timid are encouraged to work.
2. Develop a sense of confidence and security among the interns.
3. To provide facilities that is available in the school and guidance from the school faculty.
4. To provide appropriate counseling.
5. To help out the interns in storing out problems involving human relations.

##### **Orientation to students going for internship:**

The intern assumes the dual role of a student and a teacher. The intern is expected to display high standards of personal conduct, academic and technical understanding of content and pedagogy, oral and written skills of communication and professional ethics. As an intern he/ she is expected to be a diligent worker and to maintain a professional relationship with students, the mentor and other faculty members of the institution.

The intern is informed to follow, the below given instructions:

1. Be regular and punctual to the assigned school. In case, of emergency, call the coordinator or the principal by the designated time established by the school.
2. Maintain the dress code as professionals.
3. Submit all lesson plans to the mentor / subject teacher before teaching.
4. Make sure that your classes are observed and to collect the feedback from the mentor.
5. Reflective practice is needed and a desire to improve one's own teaching experience.
6. Involve themselves in different activities of the school including remedial teaching, action research, functions/ programs in the school etc.

##### **Role of the teacher's of the institution and assessing the students performance:**

The teacher exerts a greater influence over the intern's attitudes and practices and also provides an environment that is favorable to success and to the development. Make sure that all the facilities are provided to the interns and that the interns participate in all the activities of the school such as PTA meetings, co-curricular activities, tests and examinations.

During the internship, the teacher educators / mentors provide a positive feedback to the interns based on the criteria of evaluation as seen lesson plan books after observing the class. Along with this, there is a chance for peer feedback also wherein the peers give the feedback to the interns.

#### **Exposure to variety of school set ups:**

The students are already exposed to diverse school set ups by visiting to different schools in their II semester such as the special schools, Government schools, aided schools etc. The students or the interns are trained in a way where they can cope with any environmental condition of the internship school and use the assets accessible in the school for their classes.

The internship program is an integral part of B.Ed. Programme where they implement their theoretical knowledge and skills acquired during pre-internship phase under supervised condition. They are constantly monitored by head of the institution, subject experts, Method teachers and other faculty members who are scheduled for supervision. Supervision schedule for faculty members are prepared well in advance. They go to schools on rotation basis, observe the classes and feedback is given every day. Written feedback and verbal feedback and suggestion will be given for improvement. Effective monitoring during internship program is mandatory and helps the students to be proficient in skills and competencies.

The monitoring is done by giving regular and positive feedback to the students to improve the content/ knowledge and enhance professional capacities such as integrating ICT and drama in pedagogy. Lesson plans are to be approved prior to the class by method teachers. Apart from curricular aspect, monitoring of interns in extracurricular activities is done. Guiding the intern in making the class activities more lively and innovative by adopting modern teaching learning materials is systematically done. Guidance is appropriately given about the assessment or evaluation carried out during the classes and the effective use of black board in the class.

During the internship the lesson plan of the interns will be monitoring by the subject/methodology teacher of the school and the suggestions will be given.

Mentor teacher:- The school teachers observe the lessons taken up by the interns and provide the feedback

or monitor the teacher trainees individually and also support/help them and guide them in taking the teaching aids.

Peers: The peer groups have to observe at least 3-4 classes of the interns in a day and as per the criteria feedback has to be written in the observation book and give suggestions to the peer mate.

## 2.6 Evaluation Process

### 2.6.1 Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) of student learning is in place in the institution

#### Response:

St. Joseph's College of Education, Mysuru, follows the guidelines of University of Mysore, Karnataka for both internal and external assessment. B.Ed course consists of four semesters and each semester has two components for evaluation: Internal Assessment and External Assessment incorporating the Modalities of Transaction and Assessment (MOTA).

Institution has a continuous internal evaluation system where two tests (C1 and C2) are conducted along with one assignment and one tutorial per course per semester for 20 marks each which are considered for internal assessment marks. The two tests are in the pattern of Mysore University Examination. Dates and portions for the internal tests are communicated to the students before the commencement of the semester and are strictly adhered to. Results of these internal tests will be given within a week after the test. After completing all the tests, the question paper will be discussed in the class, with the scheme. Grievances, if any, will be attended immediately. Internal marks are calculated as per the University directives. Students cross check their internal marks and countersign it, before being forwarded to the University. The examination is conducted in the examination hall and it is equipped with CCTV.

Slow learners are permitted to improve their marks by redoing the micro teaching or communication, if they have scored less. They can also appear for retest in case of low marks in internal theory exam.

The college also follows a particular criteria for the internal college evaluation system, such as

**Tutorials:** Tutorials are conducted for all the students in the classroom based on the topics assigned by the subject teacher. The skills such as communication skill, presentation, time management and content knowledge are the different criteria followed to evaluate the students.

**Simulations:** The simulations are of two types namely ICT based simulation and Non-ICT simulation. Each student of 1st year has to do both ICT and Non-ICT simulation based on the topics they have selected in their respective pedagogy courses.

**Assignments:** Students are assigned the current topics by the subject teacher. Students writing skills, vocabulary skills, general awareness, content knowledge etc. are evaluated through the assignment.

**Computer / ICT Practical:** It is mandatory for the I semester and II semester to conduct the practical exam, in accordance with the prescribed syllabus. Along with practical, a viva-voce will also be conducted on the same day.

**Craft work / Work Experience:** It includes all the tasks with a major component of hands on experience that is used as a complement to theory (Art and Drama). It promotes creativity and innovative skills among the students along with team work skills.

**Internship and immersion:** It is the period during fourth semester where the students visits the schools regularly for 50 working days and undertakes the defined activities under the supervision of a guide/

mentor. The assessment will be based on the performance of the student teacher.

### 2.6.3 Mechanism for grievance redressal related to examination is operationally effective

**Response:**

The principal of the college has appointed a committee to function as Grievance Redressal Cell. The cell consists of at least 4 members from various methodologies of the college. A senior teacher will act as the coordinator. The Committee has a tenure of two academic years.

**Functions:**

To make all necessary arrangements for receiving representations/ complaints/ grievances from students

relating to examination and evaluation.

- To examine the grievances.
- To make necessary recommendations to the Principal.
- To hand over the grievances related to examination and evaluation.
- To take suitable action to overcome the grievance or solve it.

During the orientation programme, the Principal and teacher incharge brief the students about the examination-evaluation system and how the CLOs and PLOs can be attained. The college conducts tutorial, home assignment, tests, presentations, group discussion, etc. to assess the performance of students. The college exam committee executes its internal exams in a meticulous manner. New terms and marking system of CGPA and CBCS pattern is elaborated to the students.

All exam related grievances are addressed by the committee where the Principal is the chairperson. However, internal supervisors are deputed for smooth conduction of the exams. If any grievance occurs, he/she needs to apply to the exam committee. At the initial level, the committee discusses with the concerned teacher and solves issues at this primary level. Generally there is a zero tolerance policy for the malpractices conducted by the students. Since it is an internal evaluation, students cooperate in a very positive manner and up to this stage; no such serious grievance is raised in the college. Each teacher prepares a question paper by keeping in mind the rules of the UoM and academic integrity.

The institutional reforms in the continuous evaluation system are related to create interest for the study and to make the students more familiar with the university examination pattern. The institutional measures used for the evaluation are to direct and lead the students confidently towards university examination. Hence there is very little scope for grievances regarding evaluation. The students have the freedom to use the suggestion box to put in the note of query/instruction which is considered for internal examination reform.

The C1 and C2 answer books are shown to the student on a scheduled day after assessment. The students go through the answer books and know their performance regarding strength and lacunas of their studies and techniques in writing answers. If there are any mistakes or complaints regarding assessment, they clarify on the very day. All the mechanisms to deal with examination related grievances are transparent, time bounded and efficient. Mentor Mentee Scheme also helps students to pause before going to the exam committee with any grievance. It has also reduced stress and anxiety of the students.

### 2.6.4 The Institution adheres to academic calendar for the conduct of Internal Evaluation

#### Response:

- The institute prepares the academic calendar keeping in accordance with the rules and regulations based on the University of Mysore and the calendar given by UoM.
- The calendar is completely monitored by the Principal, CEO and IQAC coordinator of the institution. They ensure that it is followed by the entire faculty and the students of the institution.
- The academic calendar is prepared well in advance prior to the commencement of the academic year. The calendar summarizes the academic schedule for the upcoming year, tentative schedule of internal and external examination, exam rules and regulations etc.
- The calendar includes the dates of the internal assessments, submission of the assignments, tutorial/ seminars, simulations and microteaching dates etc. It also incorporates all the government and public holidays.
- The teacher in charge of the timetable prepares the timetable as per the guidelines of respective statutory bodies for the number of credit hours for each subject prior to the commencement of the semester. Time-table is displayed on the notice boards.
- First Internal Exam C1 is conducted after completion of 2 units. In the academic calendar it is reflected and C2 is conducted after 4 units are completed. C1 comprises one assignment and first test from each course and C2 comprises a tutorial / seminar and second test.
- The performance of the students is assessed on a continuous basis by conducting internal exams as per the UOM per semester. The tentative schedule of the CIE is included in the college handbook and is distributed to the students at the beginning of every year.
- Display of marks for all the four semesters such as the credits, passing standards and assessment pattern are also as per the plan given in the calendar.
- The institute follows the academic calendar promptly and if there is any change by the university in the dates, the institution schedules the same according to it.
- Month wise activity plan of the college for the complete academic year is given in detail.

## 2.7 Student Performance and Learning Outcomes

### 2.7.1 The teaching learning process of the institution are aligned with the stated PLOs and CLOs.

#### Response:

The B.Ed course is a professional course designed with specific predetermined outcomes. This program is designed to develop administration skills, the theoretical mind of students with skill merged via extensive practice of problem solving through case studies, role plays, simulations and presentation. Ultimate objective is to transform the student as a professional required for the teaching field.

The different activities that are aligned with PLOs and CLOs are as follows:

- All the PLOs and the CLOs have been prepared meticulously by discussing with all stakeholders and are displayed on the college website, handbook and on the charts in their respective classes.
- Teachers' induction programmes are conducted to map the learning outcomes and how to attain it.
- For students, through orientation programmes, classroom discussion, expert lectures and practicals (Internship and block teaching), all these outcomes are shared with the students.
- The college deputed teachers for workshops, seminars, conferences and FDPs to enrich them with competencies to attain the desirable outcomes while teaching-learning in the classes.

### Course Learning Outcome (CLOs)

- While implementing the EPC and EWF courses by the activities such as- communication skill, paper presentations/ seminars, microteaching, simulations, organizing of various events in the college( Talents day, teachers day, matrubhasha divas, national festivals and so on) visits to different schools ( Govt, aided, unaided, residential, special etc)and to offices (BEO, DIET)etc. the CLOs are attained.
- The attainment of CLOs of the program are evaluated through continuous evaluation which is classified as C1& C2. C1 consists of a Test and an Assignment of 5 marks each whereas C2 consists of Test 2 and Tutorial 5 Marks each.
- At the end of the semester, a feedback is taken from the students regarding the attainment of CLOs

### Program Learning Outcome (PLOs)

- The PLOs facilitate a clear understanding about the program expectations and also support the process of learning. The PLOs also present a clear picture of employability, skill development and content of the course.
- Further the outcomes help to understand the various critical issues pertaining to gender, environment, values and professional ethics.
- TET coaching is arranged for all the students pertaining to their professional growth.
- The college organizes career counseling lectures and capability enhancement programmes to effectively communicate the learning objectives and expected outcomes.
- Teacher placement cell organizes campus selection for all the students.
- Feedback is collected from passing out students as a parameter for analyzing the CLOs attainment. The CLO attainment further adds to the PLO attainment.

### 2.7.3 The progressive performance of students and attainment of professional and personal attributes in line with the PLOs and CLOs is monitored and used for further improvements

**Response:**

The progressive performance of students depends on the inputs gained in the form of content knowledge, process and product skills and work habits that are needed for the integral part of the learning and an opportunity to adopt various competencies to assess the quality of performance in the students.

- 1. Content knowledge** criterion is used to evaluate the mastery of a student's knowledge and understanding of facts, concepts and principles. Effective use of elements of the content and the plan in organizing the classes. Students also master the content regarding principles of teaching, determining what to teach, technology of teaching learning and integrating ICT skills, psychology (when and how of teaching) and various systems of education and various acts and rights related to education.
- 2. Process** criterion is used to evaluate the proficiency level of performance of a skill or process, the eminence of development of unique ideas as well as the effectiveness in the selection and execution of the methods and procedures used in a task. It will be assessed through various activities conducted during workshops, internship and immersion programmes etc.
- 3. Originality/Creativity** criterion is used to evaluate the overall quality and craftsmanship of a product or performance. How creatively student teachers can engage class, deliver content, make class interesting and inculcate creative and innovative teaching learning aids.
- 4. Impact/ Feedback** criterion is used to evaluate the overall results or effects of the performance given its rationale and the feedback given by the internship schools. Feedback from supervisors enables students to reflect on their own performance and excel.

5. **Leadership** skills to imbibe the qualities and characteristics of a good leader such as – Integrity, communication, self-awareness, gratitude, learning ability, empathy and so on. Through ‘Community Living Camps’, organisation of various club activities and various co-curricular activities leadership skills can be developed and assessed.
6. **ICT Skills** in use of media tools, techniques and emerging trends in today’s education system like blended learning, flipped learning etc. Students employ ICT skills during seminar, tutorials, LAC activities, microteaching and simulation lesson delivery. The use of LMS such as Google classroom and creating YouTube videos and quizzes through Google forms etc can be developed and assessed in the students through lab activities and practical exams and Viva. Students are taught ICT Basics in the first semester and ICT Applications in the second semester.
7. **Values and Attitude should** be exhibited implicitly and explicitly. Values connote standards, code of ethics and strong beliefs. They also include the following- open mindedness, fairness and impartiality, sincerity and honesty, patience, enthusiasm and so on. Punctuality in submitting assignments and regularity in college and other related works. These values are inculcated through and used while practice teaching and for conducting various activities.

**Curricular and co-curricular activities** are conducted during the four semesters. These are evaluated through activities and personality development activities. Organising various club activities such as Mathematics Club, Science Club, Eco Club, English Language Club, Kannada Literary Club and different events such as Talents day, Jo-fiesta etc that enhances the students performance not only academically but also professionally

\*To motivate the students to increase their effort and achievement. The marks obtained in the internal assessment are often conceived as rewards for having performed successfully and also to encourage the students to perform better.

\* Students are engaged in project works, action research, preparation of online tests, ICT based lessons, Cognitive map preparation, e-content preparation which help in sharpening their skills to match the challenges of 21st century.

\* All regional, national and international days of importance and celebrations are observed through various clubs and association activities.

### 3.3.4 Outreach activities in the community in terms of influencing and sensitizing students to social issues and contribute to community development

#### Response:

St. Joseph's College of Education tries to actively participate in outreach activities in the community. The main objective of organizing outreach activities is to sensitize students to social issues. On account of our Golden Jubilee Celebration, we had planned for various activities based on SDG (Sustainable Development Goals) put forth by UNO, due to covid-19 we could not go on as scheduled. But still we were able to organise two webinars 1. Gender sensitization and Social Justice in collaboration with Saint Thomas College of Education, Pala, Kerala. 2. Climate change- Role of oceans in collaboration, with SNM Training College, Moothakunnam, Kerala

In connection with National Science Day, a paper presentation competition was organised for the B.Ed. trainees of various B.Ed colleges. During the year 2019, when Kodagu was hit with the worst floods and landslides, the staff and students collected items which would be useful to the flood affected people and sent them across.

Due to the pandemic, staff and students collaborated with ODP (organisation for the Development of the Poor) in packing food items and sending it to the needy of remote areas of the Diocese of Mysore.

To create awareness about the pandemic, the students created a COVID Awareness video and it was uploaded on YouTube.

Every year it has become a practice to take up topics that create awareness and sensitize the students of class 8 and 9th on the social issues through innovative lessons during their practice teaching classes. Topics such as Child marriage, Female foeticide, Dowry harassment, Child labour etc were taken up for discussion in their regular classes using innovative methods.

During practice teaching, some students who were in Brindavan School took part in the Swachh Bharat Street rally.

Students here planned for an eco- sustainability drive by the disposal of waste: Plastic and use and throw pens were collected by placing cartons at different points and students and staff dropped the used pens there after the MCC authorities were informed to collect it every two months .

**4.1.1 The Institution has adequate facilities for Teaching- Learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories,sports field, fitness center, equipment, computing facilities,sports complex, etc. for the various programme offered**

**Response:**

St. Joseph's College of Education is located by the side of state Highway Mysore-Madikeri overlooking the Chamundi hills. The College has got excellent infrastructure facilities as per the NCTE guidelines in a vast area of 6.47 acres with a total built-up area of 5186.49 sq. mtr. The College building is designed with good ventilation and lighting facilities. The college has a beautiful garden and lawn on both sides.

The Institution has the Physical infrastructure as per the guidelines of the NCTE. 8 Classrooms with ICT facilities, 1 Seminar hall, 1 Multipurpose hall, 1 Conference hall, 4 Laboratories, 1 computer Centre, 1 Sports Room and Library provides the best environment for imparting and imbibing knowledge with modern technology. Students, faculty members and staff have access to the elevator. Since the building is multistoried and to facilitate differently abled students, the campus has the provision of a ramp through which a wheelchair can reach the elevator. The canteen supplies quality foodstuffs at subsidized rates. Balanced, well planned and hygienically prepared lunch and dishes are served to the day-scholars. One bore well and 3 storage tanks ensure the availability of water and the water tanks are periodically cleaned. The college has installed a 62.5 KVA Kirloskar generator with automatic Panel Board to maintain the power supply all the time. College has separate washrooms and restrooms for male and female students. Twenty-four hours security is available in the campus and CCTV is installed in all the rooms for the safety of students and a well-constructed compound wall.

#### **CLASSROOMS CUM CURRICULUM LABORATORIES**

Methodology classrooms cum Curriculum laboratories of the college are equipped with a lot of audio-visual aids such as LCD Projector, Globes, Charts, Maps, Models, Tape Recorder and many other equipment to train the pupil-teachers with basic teaching skills. All the classrooms are equipped with surveillance cameras for the smooth conduct of examinations and for monitoring the students.

#### **COMPUTER LAB**

The College has a well-equipped computer lab consisting of 40 computers with good Internet facilities for students to upgrade their knowledge from time to time. The whole College campus is Wi-Fi enabled and provides Wi-Fi facility with 300 Mbps Bandwidth. By using this facility, students continuously interact with the faculty. Online testing, submissions and courseware exchanges regularly take place.

#### **LABORATORIES**

Our College has well equipped laboratories to foster skills among our would-be teachers. Physics, Chemistry, Biology, Psychology and Language laboratories provide opportunities to equip student teachers with relevant process skills.

**SPORTS FACILITIES**

For play, the college has indoor and outdoor facilities. The college has specific sports rooms well equipped with sports material and facilities for indoor games. The college also has the following play areas in its campus.

Volleyball, Kabaddi, Kho-Kho, Badminton, Basketball and Table-Tennis.

## 4.2 Library as a Learning Resource

### 4.2.1 Institution has adopted automation of library using Integrated Library Management System (ILMS) or any other software

**Response:**

Library forms the backbone of any institution for all its educational and curricular activities. The students are encouraged to avail the library facilities in their day-to-day college activity. Our library is spacious with a carpet area of 189.23 sq. mts. and has a wide repository of books, journals, periodicals, newspapers, CDs, rare books, e-resources, bound volumes of journals, previous years' question papers, newspaper clippings, government pamphlets, etc.. The library advisory committee consists of members such as the Principal, 1 management representative and 5 faculty members. All the library acquisition decisions are taken by the committee which holds meetings once in six months to discuss the latest acquisitions of books based on requirements. A suggestion box is kept to invite further suggestions from students and teachers.

The library is fully automated. **E-Lib Software:** - library management software is used for all library operations.

- The institution library has computers with Internet facility.
- It is installed with CCTV inside and around the library,
- The staff and students come to know about the new arrivals which are displayed.

**OPAC :** Online Public Access Catalog

This facility is being provided to our students, remotely and also locally. This helps the student in scanning the library catalog. It helps in browsing the collection and locating the needed resource in the library. It serves as the electronic tool to search library resources. It is a portal to resources. The OPAC search may be for books and journals, etc. Resources could be searched under fields like Title of the Book, Author, subject, Accession No., Keywords, DDC subject etc., and journals may be searched under fields: Journal title, Subjects and Content.

This system helps the library user in understanding the library collection and accessing it efficiently.

The library has an Internet facility. There are 11 computers out of which 5 are for teachers and students, 2 are at the OPAC section for students' use and four for library work.

**N-LIST:** National library and information services Infrastructure of Scholarly Content. (N-List). This service is provided by the Information and Library Network center (An Autonomous Inter-University Center of UGC) Gandhinagar, Gujarat.

The institution does make use of the Inlibnet facility for the staff and students. The Library has subscribed to the N-List Program (INFLIBNET). Hence, students and the teachers are eligible to avail the e-resources – (about 6000 + e-journals and about 31,35,000 + e-books)

We have been a member of the N-List program since 2013. At present N-list Programme provides more than 6000 + e-journals (with 10 years) and 97,000 + books. The students and staff of the member organization can access the resources using their User ID and Password provided to them by the admin. This facility is available for a duration of one year. The membership has to be renewed every year during the month of March to access the resources.

Education is a lifelong process therefore anytime anywhere access to it is needed. It should meet the needs of a variety of learners and therefore Computer Lab is important in meeting this need. Keeping this in view, to impart best technological information to the students, the college has good conditioned, well equipped computer lab & Library consisting of 48 computers with Internet facility for students to upgrade their knowledge from time to time.

Our college is well equipped with an Information and Communication Technology (ICT) facility with very good computers with dual core processors. Each and every student is making use of these ICT facilities which helps students to make themselves technologically sound and to have good technology skills. Our

Wi-Fi was installed during 1st December 2021 with a bandwidth of 300 Mbps speed where students can make use of the Internet connection, browse the web for educational purposes. Wi-Fi is also connected to the staffroom where faculty make use of it for academic purposes and LAN cable is connected to the Principal's Room and to the office room. Our students are making use of the Information and Communication Technology for their academic development such as creating teaching and learning materials, ICT based simulation Lessons, for learning and creating teaching aids and also for e-learning and e-content development, upgradation of Kaspersky Antivirus for all the systems to protect it from malware (virus)

Students make use of these facilities for online test and submission of academic materials, 8 methodology classrooms cum curriculum labs of the college are equipped with a variety of audio-visual teaching aids such as LCD Projector. During the covid-19 pandemic time, for conducting online test and online classes, the College has purchased 3 external cameras and speakers. Our college conducts Online classes as per the instructions by the University of Mysore for 1st and 2nd year students using Google Meet. Students actively participate in the online classes and make use of the lecture during the Covid-19 pandemic situation. The college has a G-suite account and created user ID for faculty members for the smooth conduct of online classes and assignment submission.

The college has a well developed system for providing IT facilities to the users. Some of the facilities are as under:

1. The college website is monitored and updated from time to time by the IQAC cell of the college.
2. The computers and printers of the administrative office, Principal's room, Staffroom and Computer Lab are connected with LAN.
3. The whole campus of the college has Wi-Fi facility with a speed of 300 mbps.
4. Number of systems with configuration- 67 and 11 fixed LCD projectors and one portable projector
5. The institute has software installed in Computer Lab and Library (OPAC)
6. The teachers use Internet for providing notes to the students wherever required and necessary

##### PHYSICAL AND ACADEMIC FACILITIES

The college has been upgrading its infrastructure during the last five years by building new buildings and elevators. The infrastructural amenities are timely upgraded and properly maintained. There is a Planning Committee constituted solely for this purpose. To meet the quality standards and needs, the IQAC as well as the College Council makes proposals for infrastructure development to the Planning Committee chaired by the Principal. The Management committee takes the final decision on a priority basis. New infrastructure is created and upgraded to enhance academic standards and increase efficiency. The voltage and power supply is regularly checked by the appointed electricians. The service of an electrician and a plumber is made available in the campus.

##### Laboratories

Proper maintenance is done for successful use of lab equipment.

- A lab assistant maintains the lab apparatus, cleans up the lab every day
- The lab assistant maintains an issue register
- Students enter details of the required lab items / apparatus for use during practice teaching in the issue register maintained by the staff in-charge
- Fire safety equipments are set up at the lab
- Hand washing sinks are washed thoroughly
- Hand wash, disinfectant soaps and towels are kept within reach.
- Daily glassware cleaning and broken glass is thrown in a separate rubbish bin
- Stock verification is done regularly at the end of the academic year.
- Inventory maintenance and timely disposal of expired items

### Library

- Every year in the beginning of the session, students are motivated to register themselves in the library to use INFLIBNET.
- Students are given an opportunity to utilize the books during the exams by paying cost of the book which will be returned after they return the books.
- Students can take 2 books at a time and should return them within 15 days to the library and can take new books.

### Sports Facilities

The Department of Physical Education monitors the maintenance of sports equipment and service of sports facilities at least once a year.

### Computer Lab

All the systems in the lab are monitored on time and are maintained by installing or updating the antivirus from time to time. The operating system and softwares are also updated.

### Classrooms

The classrooms are modernized with LCD. Maintenance of the classrooms including furniture, doors, windows and routine cleaning is conducted.

## 5.3 Student Participation and Activities

### 6.1.2 Institution practices decentralization and participative management

#### Response:

The success of an institution is the result of the combined efforts of all who work towards attaining the vision of the institution. The Secretary of the management committee, The Principal, teaching and non-teaching faculty along with student union members, class student representatives together concentrate on fostering the progress of the institution by sharing the responsibilities and participating in the growth of the institution and act accordingly towards the aims and objectives of the Institution.

## 1. Principal Level

Principal is the member secretary of the governing council and chairperson of the IQAC. The Principal in consultation with the Staff secretary and faculty nominates different committees for planning and implementation of different academic, student administration and related policies. All academic and operational policies are based on the unanimous decision of the governing body, the IQAC and the faculty of the college. Committees such as Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC), Library Management Committee, Discipline committee, Academic Calendar committee, Evaluation committee Extension Activities & Students Welfare Committee, Annual Prize Distribution Committee, Prospectus Committee, Research committee, Website Development committee, College Annual Magazine Committee etc., work together for materialising the vision of the institution under the leadership of the Principal

### 1. Faculty level

Faculty members are given representation in various committees/cells nominated by the principal, under the IQAC. Every year, the composition of different committees is changed to ensure a uniform exposure of duties for academic and professional development of faculty members.

### 1. Students Level

For the development of students, a student council is established with various cells, clubs and committees whose functioning with various roles and responsibilities at these clubs, cells and committees reinforces decentralization and provide a platform for individuals to sharpen & display their skills with future vision, keeping in view the all-round development of students.

The Student council with due guidance from faculties, manage various responsibilities through sports, magazine, discipline, technical & cultural committee along with cells like equal opportunity cell, anti-ragging cell, women grievance cell, grievance redressal cell that operates for a safe discomfort less functioning awareness rich learning experience.

The electoral literacy, youth red-cross, mathematics, science, eco, social science and Language clubs are initiated with a multitude of activities/events organized for an out-reach experience and a better social exposure .

### 1. Non-Teaching Staff Level

Non-teaching staff also represent the governing body and the IQAC. Suggestions of non-teaching staff are considered while framing policies or taking decisions and interacting with external agencies in transacting commodities.

**Participative Management:** The institution promotes the culture of participative management at the strategic level, functional level and operational level.

1. **Strategic level:** The Secretary, Principal, Governing Body, Teachers' and the IQAC are involved in defining policies & procedures, framing guidelines, rules & regulations for the institution.
2. **Functional level:** Principal and faculty members are involved in planning various events, supporting and distributing responsibilities through sub-committee as per the plan of the event coordinator.

**3.Operational level:** The Principal and faculty members interact with government offices, external agencies & faculty members of other concerned educational departments to maintain interactions with the affiliating university.

### 6.1.3 The institution maintains transparency in its financial, academic, administrative and other functions

#### Response:

The institution maintains complete transparency in its financial, academic, administrative and auxiliary functions. To ensure good governance, transparency and accountability, the vision, mission, and goals are clearly defined at all levels.

**Financial Transparency:** The Institutional mechanism for monitoring the effective and efficient use of financial resources is by the Finance Committee/Administrative staff. All important administrative matters of the college, finalized monthly budget proposals and list of events planned are presented before the management for approvals and is discussed at the beginning of every semester.

The budget proposed and utilized is reviewed after every purpose mentioned in the proposal via bills and documents if any. Actual day-to-day financial transactions are tracked by the administrative staff for approvals and transactions.

**Academic Transparency:** The regulations, syllabus, and curriculum are uploaded on the college website. The rules and regulations are made clear in the Students Handbook which is available online and is circulated among students. All the current events, including admission, examinations, circulars, events, time-tables, workshops, training programs, campus drive information is posted on the college website as well as the college notice board. They are circulated among the staff and students. The admission process is transparent and well organized as per the norms laid down by University of Mysore and Government of Karnataka. The process is widely publicized by putting it on the college website and also by one-to-one counselling on campus who seek information regarding admission.

The evaluated scripts of examinations, assignments, tutorials, tests of perspective, pedagogy, EPC and EWF courses are verified by the students and feedback is given by the faculty. Student's signatures are obtained on all the records right next to the marks secured and to ensure transparency.

Attendance register hard copy is maintained by the staff in-charge for all the students apart from the LMS based attendance This helps to improve the quality academic process and an increase in accountability of auxiliary functions.

Regular Faculty Meetings, Institutional IQAC, Student council Meetings, Governing council meetings and Curriculum planning meetings are conducted. Monitoring Academics and Assessment Committee from the university will scrutinise the quality check every semester.

**Administrative Transparency:** Service Rules Book is available to provide information on Service rules, code of conduct and benefits available to the staff. Interaction sessions for parents and students in reference to their consent towards selection of pedagogies, activities and fee structure during admission are discussed in detail. Transparency maintained with respect to the fees structure. Student related certificates, scholarships, bus pass etc., are provided only on receiving prior requisition letter by the candidate.

Admissions are made purely on merit. The seats of management quota are admitted by considering merit and the socio-economic status of the candidate. A special fee concession is provided based on their regularity, punctuality and their performance in the first semester. Periodic review meetings at various levels are conducted to ensure transparency, accountability and corrective measures.

## 6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

### 6.2.1 The institutional Strategic plan is effectively deployed

#### Response:

The vision and mission of the college reveal the quality policy of the institution. These are attained through discussions at various levels. The thought was shared among the stakeholders and reviewed by an expert committee such as the Governing council, the Governing Body consisting of academic experts, financial experts, Management and the Principal along with the staff.

On the commencement of each academic year, an Annual plan is formulated through a calendar of events in the handbook as planned by the concerned committee and the approval of IQAC, principal and management in order to ensure and sustain quality at all levels.

“Milestone”, the annual magazine is published to reflect the skills of the student teacher fraternity of the institution. The mentoring sessions are arranged to help the students cope up with personal or academic stress.

**Practice teaching** is one of the successfully implemented activities with paramount significance in the B.Ed programme. Students who are equipped with necessary skills and competencies in simulated situations in the college will be placed as interns in 12 schools. According to the guidelines given by UOM

and NCTE, college prepares policies and strategic plans for effective implementation of practice teaching.

Considering various issues- reopening of schools in June, their academic plan will be considered usually in the month of August and students will be allotted to various schools.

The procedure followed in practice teaching is

1. Permission from BEO regarding schools.
2. Letter and visit of the coordinator to the selected school.
3. Once permission is received second letter is sent with details of immersion program: lessons to be taken, Unit Plan, Block lesson, Innovative and criticism lessons, ICT based lessons, co-school activities, remedial, action research etc.,
4. Meeting with students to finalise the location.
5. First round orientation is given by the staff regarding components of teaching, evaluation, record maintenance and remedial measures etc., before they are sent to schools followed by the second round orientation by the HMs of respective schools.
6. Leaders will be sent to schools to collect the timetable slots from the school internship coordinator and the leader shall prepare the timetable for members accordingly before the commencement of formal internship program.
7. Every Saturday students are back in the campus and will receive feedback and corrections from the pedagogy teachers.
8. The staff coordinator collects the data on no. of lessons completed in respective schools from the leader.
9. Many of the students are appreciated and absorbed by the school management as regular teachers by the end of the internship.

Deployment strategy such as construction and design of the Multi-purpose hall and its usage as a lecture hall, morning assembly hall, venue for various co-curricular activities and theatre. To fine tune the curriculum and pedagogy, peer learning methods and flipped learning methods are adopted. For development of skills, art Workshops and art expos are organised. To make students self-sustainable, science paper presentation competitions and symposiums are held. Week-long club activities are organized from Departments of Mathematics, Science, Humanities and Languages. National webinars, workshops etc., are held. Green initiatives are encouraged.

**6.2.2 The functioning of the institutional bodies is effective and efficient as visible from policies, administrative setup, appointment and service rules, procedures, etc.**

**Response:**

St. Joseph's College of Education, Mysore managed by the Mysore Diocesan Educational Society, follows a system of decentralized administration. It has a Governing Body under the patronage of Bishop with representatives and academicians from the management and a Governing Council that contains Secretary and correspondent, Management representatives, Principal as member secretary, University representative, staff in-charge as a member. The staff Council which conducts regular academic meetings consists of the Principal, IQAC Coordinator, teaching and administrative staff.

The college's Internal audit system IQAC plays a pivotal role in ensuring quality in the college activities. Management, Principal, IQAC and Staff Council nominates special invitees from industry and research institutes, Alumni members and other senior staff members as resource persons pertaining to quality initiatives organised by the institution.

The Principal and the staff council under the evaluation committee during every semester scrutinizes and approves the question papers for tests C1 and C2 as per university guidelines for B.Ed., Programme. The tests, internal marks lists are prepared by the concerned coordinators with the student signature on each record next to the assessed marks. All the records are evaluated based on the relevant criteria in all the records. The academic calendar and Handbook is strictly followed by the staff and students in collecting and submitting the records respectively. Celebrations of National and International importance, special assemblies, activities of clubs and committees, the student council formation and time tables of tutorials, simulations, field visits, workshops etc., are planned and executed according to the calendar. The discipline of the college in sticking on to the deadlines of the calendar is made mandatory

The mentoring sessions for students are planned twice a week and the students are told about every next session by mentioning the date in the feedback form, their progress in various aspects are marked and suggestions are given towards an optimistic approach. Hundred percentages on the account of attendance of both students and staff is made compulsory from the management and the list of students with shortage of attendance are displayed on the notice board on the monthly basis to keep them aware of coping up in the coming days.

There are various cells, clubs and committees each coordinated by members of the faculty and student council representatives. Committees often meet, make decisions and address various aspects of the college's functioning and report to the Principal regularly.

The college has both aided and management staff on its rolls. The recruitment process follows norms according to NCTE, University of Mysore and Government of Karnataka pertaining to minority institutions and starts with advertisement or notification about the vacant posts in the national and regional dailies. Selection is done adhering to standard selection procedures by a panel consisting of the Head of the respective department, an external subject expert, representatives from the management and the Principal. It is based on qualities like academic excellence, communication skills, teaching aptitude and a positive mind set in tune with the needs of the vision and mission of the college.

#### **6.3.5 The institution has a performance appraisal system for teaching and non-teaching staff**

**Response:**

A discreet supervision is active throughout each day in the campus by the management, and as a sign of ensuring commitment, belongingness and responsibility, confidential suggestions are provided to catalyse efficiency. Teaching and non-teaching staff are allotted and assigned duties according to the master time table. A separate schedule is made to refer to the working hours of staff individually. The work/classes

assigned, number of hours allotted, engaged and date of completion and transaction of syllabus according to the timetable is recorded. These works are monitored by the head of the institution at the end of every week and submitted to the Governing Body (the secretary and correspondent) for further scrutiny if any to ensure quality in the teaching process.

In addition to this a record of innovative tasks taken up by the staff are recorded and is maintained by the staff council, IQAC and the academic calendar committee by setting dead- lines for the task taken up duly signed by the concerned teachers next to the concern work distribution along with remarks if any. In case of laxity, the Staff Council counsels the concerned teachers. It is mandatory for teachers to submit an annual self-appraisal report and nonteaching staff to submit a performance appraisal report that gives an account of their academic performance, innovations implemented in teaching and achievements and challenges faced during the academic year. The Principal scrutinizes these self-appraisal reports and makes relevant observations.

Annual reports of research and publications are collected and whenever the Principal or the Management observes the need for improvement in pursuing excellence in teaching/research or in clearing NET / SLET, staff are reminded and encouraged to enhance their academic achievements and to take up Ph.D. with assurance of providing necessary support.

## 6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

### 6.4.1 Institution conducts internal or/and external financial audit regularly

#### Response:

For all income and expenditure, two internal audits per year is done and required receipts and payment statements are submitted to recognized chartered accountants who audit them and submit the audited reports. The Governing Body passes resolutions from time to time in respect of accounts.

The auditors obtain a copy of the budget or financial statements to study different heads of income and expenditure. They thoroughly assess the strength of the internal check. The auditors verify the cash receipts of examination fees, tuition fees, laboratory fees etc.,

Fee concessions and other charges are duly authorized by the concerned authority and any irrecoverable charges are written off only after authorized recommendation. The amount paid as salaries is vouched with the salary register and any increment to an employee is duly sanctioned and updated in the concerned

staffs' service register. Payment of salaries to the staff is checked for deduction of income tax at source, and the same is remitted to the Income Tax department. Regular verification is carried out to make sure that the staff provident fund is invested as per rules.

The establishment expenses are vouched and ensured that the capital expenditure has not been treated as revenue expenditure or vice versa. Payment of scholarship is verified with the receipts from students, scholarship register and bank statements. The balance sheet is checked to ensure that all the assets and liabilities are exhibited. The stock of equipment, stationery and furniture is verified.

The auditors cross check the payment vouchers for compliance of payment requirements. They also check the payment invoices for valid GSTIN of the dealer. Payment made by the institution for contract jobs like building repair and painting is checked for TDS deduction from the total bill amount and for prompt filing of quarterly TDS.

One external audit is done per year. The audited accounts are scrutinized again by the auditors from the Department of Collegiate Education, Karnataka. Whenever there are any objections raised, clarifications are given with supporting documents and vouchers to justify the expenses and the comments are incorporated.

### **6.4.3 Institutional strategies for mobilization of funds and the optimal utilization of resources are in place.**

#### **Response:**

A detailed monthly budget for expenditure is prepared by the IQAC and staff council before the beginning of each semester and presented to the Governing Body through the Principal, which in turn allocates funds based on the priorities and significance of the events/ celebrations and projects as per the academic calendar. Also one annual budget is prepared in the office by the administrative staff under the supervision of the principal regarding the yearly expenses (odd and even semesters) involved in the B.Ed programme.

Financial plans are made towards infrastructure improvement such as building additional ICT-enabled classrooms, laboratories and space for other amenities. The selection of vendors and service providers is made based on tenders and /or standard procedures.

Efforts are made to augment finances and adopt economic measures in some areas to ensure overall growth of the college. There has been a regular increase in the salaries and allowances paid to the staff over the past five years because of this financial planning.

Apart from the income generated from student fees collected during the academic year, the college has been mobilizing resources by conducting a number of charity programmes using the infrastructure and human resources of the college during Jo fiesta. Cash prizes are awarded to students by sponsors' fixed deposit which is used to felicitate the meritorious students during Graduation Ceremony.

## **6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System**

### **6.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) or any other mechanism has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies**

**Response:**

The IQAC of the institution was established on 26.03.2014 and has been productive in introducing several curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities. It has been the advisory and evaluative body with an aim to enhance quality. Implementation of the following modes has been the strategies for assuring quality in the institution.

- Choice of the quality initiatives:

Any quality initiative program selected by the institution involves the participation of faculty in-charge, staff, principal, administrator, CEO and secretary who will take a keen look on the significance, improvements and benefits achieved through the initiative. The coordinator of the event prepares a copy of the effects of the initiative and is discussed with all the members above. With valuable suggestions and guidance the event is taken up and executed in a systematic way.

- Ensuring quality of events organized under IQAC.

Once the event is organized the feedback is received from all the members/ participants using online or offline feedback form for further improvements and unique ideas.

- Evaluating quality of teaching and learning process through the head of the institution and governing bodies.

Offline and online classes are scheduled much prior to the date and are informed to the heads and higher authorities of the institution. The governing members undergo a check on the lecture classes, timeliness and the content shared by the faculty, methods used, attendance of the class, attentiveness of students, etc., during the class by joining online classrooms through online links or offline classes through CCTV or direct presence.

- Quality check of the resource persons.

The selection of resource person is done according to the written proposal about the event to-be by the coordinator who plans the event. The profile of the resource person is shared to the Principal and then to the Secretary with whom the relevance is analyzed and proceeded further.

- System to conduct quality initiatives through IQAC

Any Quality initiative program includes a clear mention of the name of the cell or committee under which the program is organized and is discussed in regular IQAC meetings. The objectives are submitted to the IQAC co-coordinator along with possible dates, students members involved, budget, time table, etc., two months earlier which is forwarded to the Principal for sanction.

### 6.5.2 The institution reviews its teaching-learning process periodically through IQAC or any other mechanism

#### Response:

The institution periodically reviews the effectiveness of the teaching learning process through feedback from different stakeholders. This forms the basis for the IQAC to identify the gaps in the process and to conduct faculty enrichment activities. The following are such initiatives facilitated by the IQAC to determine teaching effectiveness and learning improvements periodically.

- Attendance of Staff and Students

A serious check on the attendance of staff and students are maintained via separate biometry with finger and face detectors respectively. The College is best known for punctuality and discipline. A committed work pattern is observed through staff and student following their code of conduct and implementation of the plan as scheduled in the academic calendar.

- Knowledge sharing

Faculty members share a piece of information every day during the staff assembly regarding the latest know-hows/ information/health tips/ awareness etc., from various streams. Each person according to the turn will be sharing or presenting it before assembly and is recorded with date in a diary.

- Staff meetings and Review meetings

Regular staff meetings are arranged to discuss the academic execution of courses, field visits, submissions, presentations, portions covered or tests, allotment of extra classes, events to be organized, budget, online and offline classes according to the academic calendar.

A review meeting is arranged in between the regular meetings to ensure smooth conduct of the execution plan. For instances, online classes, pros and cons of them after a week of commencement, need for better Wi-Fi connections, need for quality cameras, high speed processors, feedback and suggestions, updated methods to adopt, etc.,

- Students' feedback

In the end of every semester, a feedback form on quality of teaching is collected by the principal from the students which includes rating scale questionnaire about the Programme, the academic curriculum, the coverage of the syllabus, timeliness, content mastery, etc., based on which the teachers are given one to one suggestions if any to keep up the quality of the institution.

- Student performance

Student Performance Analysis is made by comparing their test and exam results of perspective papers. A pre and post content test analysis is made to observe the area of improvements.

- Academic Conduct

The Governing members undergo a check on the lecture classes, timeliness and the content shared by the faculty, methods used, attendance of the class, attentiveness of students, etc., during the class by joining online classrooms through online links or offline classes through CCTV or direct presence.

This basically defines how drama is different from theatre and supports the individual to gain confidence

on their skills acquired and promotes innovative methods of teaching.

Both value education and theatre skills are prepared with a prescribed syllabus and have definite allocations of classes say twice a week, in the regular timetable with a well-designed syllabus.

## 2.ICT blended education system

The second incremental improvement achieved by the institution due to quality initiatives under IQAC of the college is the active use technology.

- Increased number of projectors
- Latest desktops with updated processors and cameras for virtual teaching
- Webinars and workshops for teacher educators to make use of online modes of teaching through online classrooms, online tests and assignment submissions, online best practices events, etc.,
- Purchase of G-Suite account for wider online platform, updating recorded events organised on the college YouTube channel.

Digital Platforms for Teaching and Learning: Organised Special talks, Webinars, Workshops (Tech-Savy 2020) for and by the students. Academic-tests/examinations, Co-curricular events, evaluation, Competitions on Reading and Reflection, Photography Competitions, online quiz or TET and CTET, collaborative Programs and certificate generation to be constantly in touch with the teaching learning process and to foster creativity in this means. Students engaging in the online teaching learning process have submitted assignments, test papers and presented lessons for which evaluated papers with score is intimated via their registered emails. According to the need of the modern era, the ICT practical syllabus is revised with an inclusion of latest online applications for the learners to digitally equip them as 21st century teachers who can organize and conduct events successfully exhibiting their smart teaching skills.

### 7.1.2 Institution has a stated policy and procedure for implementation of waste management

#### Response:

Throughout the year we are promoting and practicing the importance of waste management. Since the institution is located in the prime position of the city, MCC (Mysore City Corporation) daily takes away the garbage. Within the campus, we segregate dry and wet waste.

An initiative was taken by the Eco Club members to recycle the used pens. Initially, an orientation was given in the assembly and the objectives spelt out. A box was kept wherein the students and staff were asked to drop their used pens, sketch pens, markers, and CD writers into the box. Arrangements were made and staff of the corporation was asked to collect once in three months. The corporation would take it for recycling.

We motivate our teacher trainees to use waste products to make their own teaching-learning aids, which helps them to think differently and creative and make use of waste as best. In our campus, we have strictly prohibited thermocol sheets and its products.

Every year we repair and reuse damaged things like benches, chairs, tables to save money and reduce waste.

Our institution use refill inkjet, cartridges and laser toners. Purchase of less toxic and recyclable materials and components. The hardware resources are utilized to the optimum extent. Systems with longer guarantee period are selected. Proper use of electronic devices and timely repair help reducing e-waste.

Paper materials are an essential part of classrooms in Teacher Education Institution. By reducing paper waste in a classroom and fostering an appreciation for the importance to sustainability in Teacher Education Institution by using unused sheets of previous year's records. Institution is on the roadway to implement paperless policies to save money, reduce waste, create an organized online system for all documents, increase time for staff to focus on other tasks, and increase communication between students and faculty through online mode.

#### Teaching Practice

Every year our final semester students will engage 50 working days in different schools. In this process, our students will practice how to make use of local knowledge and resources in the teaching and learning process. ## 7.2 Best Practices

#### Response:

#### 1. Value Added Course

##### a. Value at School

From the last 5 years we are running add on value courses such as value at school, communication skill and from the last 3 years theatre and art. We developed our own syllabus to each add-on value courses.

##### Need for the Inculcation of Value-Education:

Our institution emphasizes value education throughout the teaching and learning process. Our institution prepared its own value education syllabus. In our time table, we gave two classes per week for value education other than the regular syllabus

##### b. Communication Skill

Our institution has most of the regional students struggling to communicate in English. So we are planned to provide Communication Skills Course to all. We give adequate exposure in LSRW listening, speaking, reading and writing skills and the related sub-skills. To build up the learners confidence in oral and interpersonal communication

##### c. Theatre and Art

Theatre and Art are performing arts, an outlet for self-expression, and a way of learning. Drama is an effective learning tool because it involves the student intellectually, physically, socially, and emotionally. Activities in improvisation, pantomime, play-making, and scene re-enactment serve to develop the creative

potential in the participants and help to develop critical thinking skills.

Participation in drama activities provides the teacher with another way to assess the student. Through dramatic play, students reveal how they organize ideas, solve problems, work in a group, deal with conflict, and use their imagination. Observing how students dramatize an event offers valuable insight into how they perceive, interpret, understand, and analyze the material at the core of the lesson.

Our institution has given the same weightage to both academic and co-academic activities. Every year we are conducting art workshops and pedagogy drama scriptwriting workshops. It helps to think in a creative way to understand the subjects, as well as innovative ideas.

## 2.TET coaching (Teacher Eligibility Test, conducted by Government of Karnataka)

Teacher Eligibility Test coaching facility for the 2nd year B.Ed students was introduced in the year 2019-20. This event was conducted from January to March 2020. Special time table was prepared by the management and principal and all teaching staffs was allotted various subjects. Time allotted for this TET Coaching was Daily 3pm to 5 pm. Both Kannada medium and English medium students were put together for the common subject like Kannada, English and psychology and later students were divided according to their pedagogy for the pedagogy coaching. In these coaching classes, previous year TET model question paper was solved by the teacher and teaching hacks were taught to the students. Most importantly few alumni students were also invited who already qualified both TET and CET Exams to train the students

We have been the guiding force for 93 students in their success in TET exams with good marks.
